The League of Women Voters of Chester County is a nonpartisan organization whose purpose is to serve the local community by promoting informed active citizen participation in government and by acting on selected governmental issues. The League does not support any candidate or party.

CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES

The U.S. Constitution requires that the House of Representative be composed of elected Representatives (also called Congressmen or Congresswomen) from each State. There are 435 members of the House of Representatives. The number of Representatives from each state is proportioned according to its population, with 18 Representatives from Pennsylvania. A US Representative must (1) be at least twenty-five years old, (2) have been a citizen of the United States for the past seven years, and (3) be (at the time of the

election) an inhabitant of the state they represent. A Representative's term of office is 2 years.

The House of Representatives is responsible for creating the budget and initiating bills to collect taxes and other money, although all bills must pass the Senate and be signed by the President. The House is also responsible for impeaching federal officials (the Senate then tries the case) and electing the President if there is a tie in the Electoral College.

Q: Partisan gridlock in Washington has brought our government nearly to a

standstill. If elected, what steps will you take to reduce partisan gridlock? Please be specific.

A: I am no career politician, I am a Veteran and businessman running for Congress to bring needed leadership to Washington and continue my commitment of selfless service to our nation. Political divisiveness and partisan gridlock led me to pursue elected office. When partisan bickering shut down the government in 2013, I knew that I had to step up. A: Congress must work with the people to pass a Constitutional Amendment that negates the Citizens United Supreme Court Additionally, Congress ruling. should public funding for establish federal campaigns, with significant penalties for those that violate the provisions. This would include mandatory television time for all federal candidates. These steps will take money out of politics and take out the need to constantly raise money. This will allow to collegiality among Congresspeople in both parties to return. In turn this will reduce gridlock.

Q: In Shelby County v. Holder, the US Supreme Court invalidated provisions of the

Voting Rights Act, which has led to disenfranchised voters across the US. If elected, what will you do to ensure that the voting rights of all Americans are protected?

A: The Supreme Court in Shelby County v. Holder prematurely took away the substance from the Voting Rights Act. Since it did so, states have made it harder for people to vote by enacting Voter ID laws, cutting hours and locations for voting, purged the rolls, and ended same day registration. Congress must pass the Voting Rights Advancement Act as soon as possible to remedy this terrible situation. Government should make it easier for people to vote – not harder. In general, Congress should take steps to establish Internet Based Voter Registration, Same Day Registration, Early Voting and Vote-By-Mail on a nationwide basis.

Q: Ensuring that all voters have access to the ballot box is one of the essential functions of government, yet Pennsylvania voters have some of the most restricted access to the ballot in the nation. Pennsylvania is one of only 9 states without any of the following reforms: early voting, optional vote by mail, pre-registration for 16 and 17 year olds, or same day registration. If elected, will you support increasing access to the ballot through these reforms? Please explain your answer.

A: As a country and a Commonwealth we have moved to expand access to voting throughout our history. It is time we took another leap forward and made voting as simple and easy as possible. Reforms like early voting, vote by mail, 16-17 year old preregistration, and same day registrations. all increase the likelihood that voters across our communities would have an opportunity to vote and I stand on the side of enfranchising voters. Not only do these reforms assist voters, but they also provide an incentive for people to be involved in following issues and races throughout campaigns. In terms of preregistration of 16-17 year olds, research clearly shows that young voters who vote in the first election in which they are eligible to vote in are likely to be voters for life. Pennsylvania should be on the side of helping people to have their voices heard, not hindering the process.

Q: Partisan gridlock in Harrisburg has brought our government nearly to a standstill. If elected, what steps will you take to reduce partisan gridlock? Please be specific.

A: It starts with taking seemingly small steps to find common ground and to foment relationships with other legislators that build the basis for trust in the process of negotiation. While legislators on both sides of the aisle differ in the ways we want to improve the state, I believe that the overwhelming majority of legislators care deeply about making Pennsylvania an exceptional place to live and work. Building off this positive assertion and common ground, negotiations begin with clarity about those issues that are up for debate and those that are not. Many of our most difficult require incremental issues steps and sustained pressure over several legislative sessions to get passed. No one wants gridlock in the general assembly, but like anything, it starts with building relationships and getting things passed that we agree on and providing sustained focus on those items where we differ and may take more time and nuance.

A: Gerrymandering is a scourge on our democracy at both the national and state levels. The term of this office runs 2016-2020 and has the opportunity to put Pennsylvania on a path that would remove partisanship from the redistricting process. Building off of what other states have done, I recommend a completely independent process by which a computer algorithm draws new congressional and state district lines following the parameters of equal population, race and ethnicity to ensure equitable access and representation of all citizens. Once the algorithm comes up with 'ideal' districts, it is given to an independent commission made up of citizens who are neither legislators nor their staff, nor associated with any lobbying group, to approve, adjust and recommend the final districts. When left to legislators of either party, the process is bound to be unfair. I pledge to work to end this partisan charade.

Pennsylvania is one of only 9 states without any of the following reforms: early voting, optional vote by mail, pre-registration for 16 and 17 year olds, or same day registration. If elected, will you support increasing access to the ballot through these reforms? Please explain your answer.

A: In a democracy, voting should be made easy, not made difficult. That is the reason why other states have made meaningful efforts to increase citizen ballot box access. One significant Pennsylvania step has been establishing the ability to register online that has resulted in significant new voter registration. The next step would be to allow same-day registration. Other states have systems in place to implement a safe system of same-day registration and so can we. Certainly, allowing voters the option to vote by mail and pre-registration of 16 and 17 year olds are significant ballot access reforms as are easier absentee voting rules. With ever-increasing technology, the ability safely vote on-line deserves to consideration.. Additionally, Ι have advocated a non-partisan process for the election of school board members, not only because school boards should be nonpartisan, but also because of the difficulty that registered independents have getting on the ballot. I also support citizen initiative and referendum in Pennsylvania.

Q: Partisan gridlock in Harrisburg has brought our government nearly to a standstill. If elected, what steps will you take to reduce partisan gridlock? Please be specific.

A: I have and will continue my efforts to reduce partisan gridlock in the legislature. First, you have to reach out to other legislators with respect and civility. You also have to be honorable and keep your word. In my work as minority chair of the Education Committee, I have successfully used the principles stated above in establishing a bi-partisan approach to education. Through dialogue, a knowledge of the issues, and a sincere desire to resolve those issues, you can create an atmosphere where agreements and disagreements are and. ultimately, from which stated constructive policies emerge. Based on my experience in the Senate, I can tell you that this approach works. Additionally, in terms of reducing partisan gridlock, the further development of bi-cameral legislative caucuses on matters and topics of shared concern is a key. These caucuses have members of both parties from both the House and the Senate who work together on areas of mutual policy concerns and develop bi-partisan legislative initiatives.

Purposely gerrymandered districts are lopsided in terms of one-party registration, resulting in legislators who often appeal to only one group of voters and prevent seeking consensus in the legislative process. In my view, the importance of removing elected officials in the redistricting process is the main way to assure districts are established that are compact in size, geographically contiguous, representative the complete and of

demographic of a county or region. I have and will continue to support legislation that calls for an independent citizen commission to draw the maps based on fairness and statistical verification. When we establish districts that are truly representative of an area, we can increase the possibility of more competitive districts. Politically competitive districts are one of the essential steps in the election of responsive legislators who care abut all.

For that reason, I propose that voting via absentee ballot by mail should be open to all voters for any reason. This would allow for the same independent monitoring of the election that we enjoy today and afford those who would not be able to make it to their polls on Election Day the opportunity to vote.

I do agree with recent changes allowing voter registration on-line, would allow 17 year olds who will be 18 by Election Day to pre-register, and would accept certain absentee ballot changes that make it easier for people to vote by mail.

A: Generally, I will work with anyone, of any political party, who has good ideas that make positive impact can a for Pennsylvania's citizens. A: I agree that Pennsylvania has some archaic voting practices. The most critical change I would like to see made is to take the "vote party line" option off of the Pennsylvania ballots. Voters should only be able to make selections of individual candidates and not have a vote a party button. In Delaware County where I live, the Bureau Elections does not even report the number of "party line" selections in their elections results even though it is currently a selection on the ballot. Along with looking at the mentioned voting reforms, I would also like to see groups like the League of Women Voters host more debates to allow the voters to better know the candidates. I think the debates should be video recorded and posted on the Internet for voters to see. As a former military member who has voted absentee while serving overseas, posting of the debate videos on a neutral website like the LWV would be very valuable tool to helping our service members make informed choices.

Q: Partisan gridlock in Harrisburg has brought our government nearly to a standstill. If elected, what steps will you take to reduce partisan gridlock? Please be specific.

A: I am a citizen running for elective office that is not aligned with either political party, an independent. My path to get elected will be much harder, but I believe our system of government has become to ensnared in two party politics. Our state legislators are beholden to their party caucuses and the PAC's they get their campaign funding from, not serving the people of their respective districts or Pennsylvania. I believe my skills and experience will provide me with the ability to succeed as a legislator without needing to be managed in the background by the party caucus. ABSENTEE VOTING

Registered voters who are ill, disabled, or will be absent from the municipality on Election Day may vote by absentee ballot. **Completed applications for civilian absentee ballots must be** <u>received by the county Board of Elections by 5 P.M.</u>, **Tuesday, November 1, 2016. Completed civilian absentee ballots must be received back at the Board of Elections by 5 P.M. on Friday, November 4, 2016**. If an emergency arises (unexpected illness or business trip) after the Tuesday application deadline, call your county Board of Elections for information on emergency absentee voting. Proof of emergency may be required. An emergency application and ballot can be obtained and voted by 5 P.M. on Friday, November 4, 2016. Any disabled voter having questions regarding the accessibility of a polling place should consult the county Board of Elections.

WRITE-IN VOTING

Information for write-in voting will be available at the polling place.

ELECTION DAY PROBLEMS

If your right to vote is challenged at the polls on Election Day and the problem cannot be resolved at the polling place, the judge of elections at the polling place should telephone the county Board of Elections. The problem could be resolved by phone if your name appears on the county records. If it does not and you want to try to resolve the problem, then you can go in

person to the county Board of Elections where a judge from the Court of Common Pleas will be on duty to resolve election problems. Alternatively you can ask for and vote by provisional ballot. If it is later determined that you were eligible to vote your ballot will be counted. You will be given instructions on how to determine if your vote was counted.

IDENTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS FOR NEW VOTERS

If you are a new voter or if you are voting at a polling place for the first time, then you must bring your voter ID card or a photo ID such as a driver's license, student ID or some other form of Federal or State government issued ID. Some forms of non-photo ID are also acceptable such as a firearm permit, current utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, or government check. If you do not have any acceptable ID, then you must be allowed to vote by provisional ballot.

If you are not a new voter and are not voting at your polling place for the first time,

you are NOT required to bring or provide identification.
