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Nonpartisan: Merriam Webster Dictionary definition

- Not partisan
- Free from party affiliation, bias, or designation
- Not supporting one political party or group over another



Nonpartisanship in the LWV

✓ Our mission is to encourage informed and active participation in government.

✓ We encourage our members to be informed participants in political activity.



Nonpartisanship in the LWV

- That doesn't preclude us from taking action on issues on which we have positions derived from member study and agreement.
- We are nonpartisan in our advocacy.
 Our only interest is the general welfare of our democracy and citizens.



Nonpartisan policy for LWV board members

- To avoid any possible perception of partisanship, our most visible leaders are asked to refrain from partisan political activity and support during their terms in office.
- A nonpartisan policy is developed and implemented annually by each local, state and U.S. League.



League messaging

- The term nonpartisan can be confusing and mean different things to different people. Many don't believe groups can truly be nonpartisan in such politically divisive times.
- So we say instead,

The League neither supports nor opposes candidates or political parties.



- Partisan polarization is undeniably the central and most problematic feature of contemporary American politics.
- Ideological schism extends from Congress to state and often local government, to party activists, to the public.

"Crisis Point"

In Congress,

- Roll call voting patterns show ideological gap between parties is greatest since 1879.
- Most conservative Democrat is slightly more liberal than most liberal Republican. That is, the degree of overlap between parties is zero.



In Congress,

- Members don't know one another or communicate anymore, much less work together across party lines.
- There's **lack of shared determination** to get things done...to compromise.
- Members maintain a short work week.
- Members must run permanent campaigns.

Current state of political polarization In the American electorate...

- Partisan division and antipathy are deeper and more extensive than in decades.
- The two parties look less alike today than at any point over the last quarter-century on characteristics like race, ethnicity, religious affiliation, education.
- Critical elements of general public are pulled in direction of political elites.



In the American electorate...

- Most ideologically oriented are more likely to vote, donate to campaigns, and make their voices heard.
- Partisans view the other party as "a threat to the nation's well-being."
- Partisans are more likely than others to say their friends share their political views.
- Self-identifying **independents** are <10% of electorate.
- For **broad public**, the style and tone of partisan debate are often **unsettling**.

Roots of political polarization

- Mismatch between parliamentary style parties and separation of powers system
- Gerrymandering
- Party fissures
- Party realignment in the South
- Changing migration patterns
- Residential sorting
- Rise of partisan press & social media
- Elections awash with money



These developments brought...

- Vast ideological gulf and intensified war between the parties
- Internal homogeneity of parties
- Rough parity between parties
- More consistent party-line voting
- News outlets, platforms & outside groups that reinforce partisanship and ideological purity
- Hotly contested, never-ending battle to control White House & Congress
- Toss-up elections for party control



A CNN/ORC post-2016 election poll of Americans finds:

- Over 8-in-10 say the U.S. is more deeply divided on major issues than in the past several years.
- Over half are dissatisfied with how U.S. democracy is working.
- A sizable minority personally agree with both parties on at least some issues.
- Nearly 8-in-10 want the GOP-controlled government to incorporate some Democratic policies into its agenda.



How do we treat our ailing political system?

- Institutional fixes
- Strengthen campaign finance rules
- Expand the vote





Near-term strategies to change the political culture

...Voters have the capacity and bear the ultimate responsibility for healing a broken and very dysfunctional political system.

- Restore public shame for distortions, lies and other actions that coarsen culture and discourse
- Recreate public square to ameliorate impact of partisan media

When you hear the League of Women Voters, what comes to mind?





- The anchors of the League of Women
 Voters brand are providing fact-based
 election information and remaining
 unbiased--rarer and rarer these days—and
 having a long history.
- Voters primarily associate the League with voting rights and voter education.
- League voter information is trusted and reliable.

The intersection of information-sharing and neutrality is at the core of the League of Women Voters brand.

"Yes, LWV offers much information to help equip voters." – Female, Online Activist

"I think people trust them because they put out information on so many diverse topics and they do so in a professional unbiased manner. They simply supply the facts, which is what people are looking for." - Female, Online Activist

"I think providing the fact-based information...it makes me feel like if I really wanted to know what the issues were so I could figure out who I should vote for that they could provide that information to me in a factual way so that I don't have to feel like I am getting pushed one way or the other to make a decision." – Female, Unfamiliar with LWV

There is some resistance to expanding beyond the realm of non-partisan, unbiased voter information.

Advocacy does not seem like as natural a fit for many especially when the League goes beyond voting or, to a lesser extent, women's issues.
